

SNIPE HUNTING – Walter Mullett


To catch a snipe, you need just two things, a dark, moonless night in the summer and a burlap sack. Now what you want to do is to....

Oops – wrong snipe. I really want to write about the snipes I learned about at SOFA. This was a completely new term for me as used with period hardware. Read on and we will get to the snipes as a part of "Rat Tail Hinges" demonstrated by Marsha Nelson who I wrote about last time.



So here is a rat tail hinge with a snipe. The snipe is "hairpin" that works as a bolster to support the barrel of the hinge and keep it from sliding down the pintel and also from rotating.


You can find some reproduction rat tail hinges that don't use a snipe but use what looks like an eye screw.



The difference between these is that the snipe is inserted through the frame at an angle as shown and clenched in the back which keeps the barrel in line with the joint between the door and frame. The eye


bolt, instead, goes perpendicular through the frame and in order to do this. The leaf of the hinge has to be longer.

The snipes are flattened 1/8" dia. steel about 4" long and wrapped cold around a 3/16" dia mandrel which is the diameter of the future pintel. (Obviously – if you heat this at all – don't quench! If you think it work hardened – anneal it.)



Start the pintel by pointing your 3/16" stock, then isolating a "bean" on the end. Form the leaf over the edge of the anvil. Start with half faced blows so leaf is flush with the round stock to one side. Draw out the neck and finish by punching the

hole for future rose head nail or screw. Use a bolster for this so that the stock







Start the hinges by cutting 18 GA material into strips for multiple hinges. In this case the strips were 2 ½" wide. Mark the width of the hinge (again about 2 ½"), insert that end into vice and bend the stock 90 degrees cold.

For the next step, you need a jig. Cut a piece of flat bar stock at least as wide as your hinges will be. Along the end of the stock,

braze a 3/16" round rod so that it is flush with the end of the bar. On the opposite end and opposite face, you can braze another sized rod for a different pintel size.




Again working cold, insert the hinge end and jig into your vice and bend




the hinge cold around the pin mandrel. After inserting a short, temporary pintel pin, fishing closing the hinge over the mandrel with the mandrel hooked over the edge of the anvil. All work is cold. Remove the pin.

Prepare to weld by building a coke cave. You want a clear yellow / blue fire for welding. Place the hinge in the cave open side down at first. Remove, flux and place back in – open side up. Weld with barrel over the edge of the anvil using flat hits welding open end with first hit



then barrel side second. Then switch to cross pein to start flaring hinge. Reheat, flux edges and re-weld.

head to finish flaring.





Hinge barrel will curve so heat and drive a tapered pin mandrel through the barrel to straighten and remove it before

cooling. Finish the hinge by cutting it off the stock and shaping with a cold chisel. File the edges and punch with a bolster like you did the leaf.

It is pine rosin based with no petroleum or animal products used in the making. Quantity and WRABA membership discounts offered as well as shipping discount. Pitch It To You - Chasing/Repousse Pitch

A Division of A Copper Rose Metal Art

Safety / Info Sheet

While there are no toxic elements to this chasers pitch there are some basic safety guidelines you should follow:

- ★ As with any materials you work with that involves any type of open flame, keep an appropriate fire extinguisher handy.
- ★ There may be some minimal smoke created when using this product. Though there are no toxic fumes or smoke created, it would be recommended to always work in a well ventilated area.
- ★ Do not heat this pitch to a runny, liquid state as this would create a potential serious burn hazard. You only need to heat the pitch to a warm temperature that is just soft enough to press your metal into it for good adhesion. The use of an industrial grade heat gun or plumber's torch is more than sufficient to accomplish this.
- ★ That being said, always wear protective leather gloves and safety glasses when working with pitch, metal and open flame.

For first time users, below is an illustrative instructional guide on loading up your pitch bowl with your chasers pitch.

Figure 1: TIP: Use some basic plaster to fill up the bottom half of your pitch bowl prior to loading with the pitch. This simply fills up what would be unused space in your bowl so you don't have to use so much pitch to actually fill the bow (you will only be using the top surface), leaving yourself extra pitch to use later in your project. Plaster needs to dry completely.

- Figure 2: The pitch will arrive already broken into chunks. Place the chunks into your pitch bowl as illustrated.
- Figure 3: As illustrated, use your plumber's torch or industrial heat gun to slowly and evenly melt the pitch chunks. Again, do not heat too fast to a runny, more liquid state due to burn hazard.
- Figure 4: This is what your pitch bowl should look like after you have melted the pitch. It is now ready to use for your metal project.


